Parish Council Report - March 2019

The Council met on Monday 4th March

Playing Field & Equipment:

The field and play equipment are the most used asset the Council has, and as such it is always an area for investment and on-going maintenance. By the time you read this, the fence around the toddlers' play area will have been repaired, the safety surface surrounding the roundabout power washed and cleaned of all the rotted leaves from the nearby trees, the seat on the zip-wire replaced, and new goalposts erected. Apart from the goalposts, all the work has been done by volunteers, which allows the Council to save money, that can then be put to capital funding items such as new play equipment. A big thank you to the volunteers who contribute so much.

Street Lights:

Cllr Blackmore attended a Street Lighting Forum held by ENC in March, from which we learnt that virtually all Councils have been unsuccessful in applying for grants to replace lights. Therefore, the Council decided the only way forward will be through a loan. There are some different options for loans and the next step is for Council to evaluate the various options and their impact on the budget and future precept rises. The Council has to apply to the Secretary of State for permission to take out a loan and a number of other official steps to go through before anything is actually agreed.

Wild Flower Area:

The turf has been stripped from the wildflower area in readiness for sowing. In Year 1 the display will be limited to some annual wildflower varieties. It is hoped that over time, the area will develop into an attractive area both visually and for wildlife, especially pollinators which are so important. When sown the area will be covered by a net to prevent birds and rabbits undoing the hard work. Please keep your dogs off the seeded area.



Who swiped our knobs and buttons?

Everywhere you look there are touch screens. Smartphones, tablets, laptops, supermarket self-checkouts, cars. Don't get me wrong, I love the utility and entertainment that my iPhone provides but I am getting a bit bored of the ubiquity of the touch screen. Sometimes a touch screen just does not do as good a job as a knob, a button, a switch, or a slider. I find this to be particularly true in some of the latest cars. A touch screen is fine for setting the destination on a SatNay, isn't it just plain dangerous to have to swipe and prod your way through several screens to turn down the heat or switch on a heated seat? What was wrong with the buttons and knobs that have controlled these things for years? Car manufacturers promote their shiny new technology toys and new interfaces but what they don't tell you is that it's cheaper to embed all these features in a touch screen than to install separate switchery (is that a word?). The most absurd example I have come across is in some upmarket Audis and Porsches. In most cars you control the direction of the air coming from the dashboard air vents with a little lever and you control the air flow with a wheel or a plastic knob in the middle. Simple time-honoured approaches to a pretty simple task. But the Germans decided that you need to use a touch screen which presents you with a virtual representation of the little lever and sliders in place of the wheels. Why? Did anyone ask for this? And in 15 years time when these cars have been sold on to the 10th owner will they still work? The other great advantage of buttons and switches in a car is that you know where they are. They don't move and you don't have to swipe left or right and take your eyes off the road to find them.

Another loss is the physical keyboard. A few years ago, I was unlucky enough to have to use a Blackberry. It was basically rubbish, but the tiny physical keyboard worked a treat. Clever though the on-screen keyboard is on my iPhone, I make far more mistakes then I did with the Blackberry. Add to this the loss of tactility; sliding your grubby finger across a piece of glass with no physical feedback is no substitute for the delightful feel of a nicely engineered metal volume control on an old hifi or the satisfying click of a nicely damped switch. Then when you try to polish away the smeary finger marks your satnav thinks you want to go to Barcelona.

Of course, with enough money there is still a place for beautifully engineered knobs, switches and buttons – just take a look at the latest Rolls-Royces and Bentleys – shame they are way above my pay grade. At a more prosaic level HP do still make the HP12C calculator which they introduced in 1981. Its keyboard has the same buttons and feel as the original and it must be one of the longest produced pieces of digital technology. I imagine they must only sell a handful as most people just use the calculator app on the phone but it's nice to see some companies still providing tactile feedback!


