# NEWS & REPORTS

**The Parish Council** met on the 3rd April.

## **Matters Arising** from previous meeting

- Mowing by the new grass contractors is of a good standard. Two cuts have been carried out
- The partially blocked drain outside No 25 Main St has been reported to 'Street Doctor'

## **Clerk's Pay**

Following a performance appraisal carried out by Cllr Webb, Council discussed the Clerk's pay rate. Due to her rapid progress it was agreed to move her pay from Level 15 to Level 17 and her pay will increase in line with the guidelines set out by NCALC. This will be backdated to 1st April.

## **Parish Council Election – 7th May**

Five residents have presented nomination papers to ENDC. Andrew Hansford, Tom Holmes, Liz Holland, Roger Flack and Russ Jenner. All 5 will take office on the 8th May and sign their declarations of acceptance at the Parish Council meeting on 11th May. This will leave 2 casual vacancies on the Council.

## **Electricity Costs**

EON have increased their prices for the first time in 9 years by 50% from 8.24 pence per kWh to 12.40 pence per kWh. Despite the increase this does represent good value when compared with other providers. However Council were advised that the electricity is unmetered. Cllr Holmes will query with EON their method of charging and report back.

## **NCALC Subscription**

The annual subscription has increased from £288 to £400. The Clerk will query the significant increase and report back.

## **Finance**

Cllr Webb had performed an internal financial review, and the accounting was found to be adequate and effective and in line with proper practice. The BDO external governance statements were read out and agreed by Council and duly signed by the Chairman.

Significant variances were discussed with a large increase in the projected reserves. It was confirmed that funds were allocated to the maintenance and replacement of playground equipment, and future boundary churchyard wall repairs.

## **Clean up Day**

This had been well attended and Cllr Hansford extended his thanks to all involved. A great deal had been achieved – 2 new stand pipes have been installed for the allotments, and bollards at the end of the car park by the village hall entrance. Vehicular access to the playing field via Ashby's drive has been blocked off at the first opening, to

avoid the risk of an accident involving anyone using the zip wire. Cllr Hansford was thanked for organising this as it is a community building exercise as well as improving the appearance of the village.

### **Diamond Jubilee Trees**

The trees were initially incorrectly positioned but this has been rectified. A watering rota has been put in place as the trees require watering each week for the first year.. At the same time the spoil heap from the village bonfire has been improved and grass seed has been put down. However a new site will need to be identified for the village bonfire later this year.

### **Annual Parish Meeting**

In an effort to encourage better attendance Council agreed to re-name this meeting to become The Annual Village Meeting and this year it will be held on 2nd June.

### **Outgoing Councillors**

Cllr Webb thanked Cllrs Haynes and Burgess for their service and contribution. On behalf of the whole of Council Cllr Burgess thanked Cllr Webb for his service as Chairman for the last 8 years.

The next Parish Council meeting – The AGM – will be on the 11th May at 7.30pm followed by the normal monthly meeting starting at 8pm.

## **St Mary's Church**

Dear All

Late on Easter Sunday afternoon, I went upstairs to change out of my clerical garb, and found in the far corner of the wardrobe, a red fleecy thing with a zip that looked warm enough for the afternoon, that was just turning cold. I went into the kitchen where my son, who was visiting for an Easter dinner, looked up in disbelief and cried out “That’s A Hoody!” For that, it seemed, is what I had found; not that I have worn it with the hood drawn tight around me, or that I was about to ‘mug’ anyone.....so I tend to forget that is what it is and all the associations it may conjure up. Appearances though, can be deceptive, for clad as I was, the vicar was still inside.

A neighbour had warned me about her dog saying that he “was not very friendly” and on my previous visit he had been kept away either in her car or in another room, but on this occasion he was off for a walk with one of the family, but I was determined to have a look at him. I saw a mid-sized spaniel with a glossy black, rather charmingly curly coat with bright eyes and a wagging tail. I approached with a smile but was soon jumping back faced with some bared teeth and unmistakeable snarling. Appearances can be deceptive.

It is the same of course with people; (and probable about all the new people I have met over Easter), that we never really know the other and cannot be sure at all

what joys or struggles are part of our neighbours' lives. It is easy for us to hit the wrong note in our relationships, which is why the presence of God who knows us perfectly is at once worrying and reassuring:  
Psalm 139 puts it this way:

O Lord, you have searched me and known me.  
You know when I sit down and when I rise up;  
you discern my thoughts from far away.  
You search out my path and my lying down,  
and are acquainted with all my ways.  
Even before a word is on my tongue,  
O Lord, you know it completely.

Worrying, because God knows all those things we think or dream, but would not wish others to be aware of and reassuring, because whatever our trouble or innermost thoughts God knows them already so we need not fear or hold back. To God, appearances are not deceptive.

Grasping this essential idea is only one of the many qualities that make having a conversation with God so especially fruitful, wherever we are in our lives and whatever the circumstances. Whether our eyes are bright and our tails are up or if we have withdrawn into a private hood, God can reach us and sustain us for there is no pretence, image or appearance that might disguise or mislead God's perfect understanding.

## **Woodnewton Neighbourhood |Watch**

### **Neighbourhood Watch Contacts Meeting March 2015**

We held our quarterly contacts meeting at the end of March. The meeting was attended by a new PCSO – Arthur Pereira. Arthur's brief includes a task to establish better communications across the Neighbourhood Watch groups within our area. Arthur also highlighted some of the current police concerns for our rural area :-

- Please ensure that items that are left in parked vehicles are kept out of sight.
- There have been recent cases of front doors and garage doors being found to be left unlocked during the day (and also at night!). Although residents may be inside the house, open doors invite opportunist thieves to enter your property and make off with what they can grab.

Other items that were raised in the meeting included:-

- Some residents only put their porch lights on when they go out at night. If a burglar is watching a property then he may notice this as an unusual occurrence and assume that you are OUT. Therefore try to leave the usual night time lights on in your property when you go out at night.
- The cuts to the police budget in the new financial year will result in a reduction in police numbers for our area. Therefore it's in our own interests to try to do as much as we can ourselves to secure our properties and our community. - New cars these days have automatic headlight sensors that switch on when you are driving in dim/foggy light and obviously also at night. Please check that your car, if using this feature, has the rear lights switched on as well as there have been instances in foggy mornings where cars have their headlights on but not their rear lights.

### **Protect your pension**

With effect from April 6th this year, when you reach 55 and if you have been saving in a personal or company pension, you will have wider choices with what you do with the fund you have accrued. You will still be able to cash in the fund to buy an annuity giving you a guaranteed income for life, but now you will also be able to release as much of the fund as you wish ... to spend on what you like.

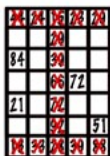

# COLUMNISTS

Keep Fineshade fine. Keep Jack's Green green.

On 18th Feb 2015 East Northamptonshire Council (ENC) Development Control Committee refused an Application for Fineshade with a unanimous vote. So Fineshade is fine for now. What about an almost identical Application at Jack's Green? (Jack's Green is in the triangle between Apethorpe, King's Cliffe and Woodnewton. If you walk from King's Cliffe to Yarwell Jack's Green is midway, 1,5 miles from KC).

The Application 14/02225/FUL was accepted by ENC on 18 December 2014, with consultation date running over Christmas period. The Application is for 55 three/four bedroom caravans, 9 camping pitches, access infrastructure (access road winding through from King's Cliffe - Wansford road to a potential connection to Nassington - Apethorpe road ), associated drainage, service provision, visitor facilities and landscape planting.

The Target Determination Date was on 19 March. However, the latest news from ENC is that the Application will not be decided before June 2015, 'or maybe later'. So there is still time for everybody to comment on the application. You can submit your comments via ENC website or if you wish to object to the proposal you can sign a petition at: <https://you.38degrees.org.uk/p/stopjacksgreen>. (To find the petition you can also google 'stop jack's green' - it will be one of the top hits.)

Most of the comments on ENC website object to the proposals which is quite logical. After all, the reasons for objecting to Fineshade Development could be carbon copied for Jack's Green: the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) guidelines deem unsuitable "development resulting in the loss or deterioration of irreplaceable habitat", "unless the need for, or the benefits of, clearly outweigh the loss". Jack's Green is a wilder version of Fineshade with the wildlife and nature still undisturbed. In addition to dormice (protected species on both sites) there are two extremely rare butterflies at Jack's Green (purple emperor and black hairstreak) and the protected violet click beetle. Also, Jack's Green is close to the area of outstanding natural beauty (SSSI Belford Purlicus Ancient Woodlands) which the development overspill will damage.

## On The Plot

As far as I am concerned, May is one of the most lovely months of the year. With weather that is often lovely without temperatures being too high, new growth and blossom everywhere and birds singing their hearts out its a great time to be outdoors and to be getting on with jobs in the garden.

The risk of late frost is never far away however, so do keep a few cloches or a supply of fleece handy. Potato tops will be showing now and it is best to protect these by additional earthing up. It gets to a point where this is no longer practical and then other tactics are needed. Fleece is not always a good protector as the leaves tend to be caught by the frost where they touch the material. I reckon that once I have earthed up as far as I can, then the plants take their chance. Any frost damage soon is replaced by new growth.

Try to sow some main crop carrots for winter use this month. I cover mine as soon as this is done, using Veggiemesh from Garden Naturally. This is done mainly to protect plants from carrot fly. The cover stays on until the last carrot is harvested, and using this method I have never had such good crops. I recommend it highly.

When planting tomatoes think about fixing the support canes about 30 degrees off vertical. In theory this method allows the fruit trusses to hang free of the leaves and the fruit to benefit more from the sun as a result.

As plants get into really active growth they need every bit of fertility the ground has to offer. Some people readily add fertilisers such as Growmore, but if you try to grow organically, try spreading a mixture of dried compost or manure and blood, fish and bone. This provides a very good top-up feed at just the time that plants need it to give of their best.



Talking of compost and manure, how is it best to store it? Well, a local team working under the name of 'Mr Muck' is now able to install their 'Muckbox' on your plot or in your garden. Here they are building a prototype using only the finest materials. Do let me know if you would like them to complete an installation for you - but be quick, there is already a long waiting list (with an emphasis on waiting).

My second shot is of their most recent customer, clearly quite at a loss for words to explain his delight with their workmanship and product.

Right - time to pack my bags, I think.

## Village Improvements

During that lovely street party we had in June 2012 to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee a collection was taken to buy a commemorative 'something' for the village. The money (nearly £800) was entrusted to the Parish Council. Over the coming months ideas were discussed until finally a decision was reached to plant some trees on an un-used part of the allotment area.

Never ones to miss a bargain, the council were offered a great deal for a set of trees to be professionally planted at a very favourable rate, which they agreed to. Come the day before the agreed planting, the contractors turned up, got out their map and went ahead & planted the trees. With no-one there to put them right (our council reps did turn up next day at the agreed date & time!), the contractors mis-read the map and put the trees on the only piece of flat ground near the village hall.

Never ones to take such misfortune lying down, the council promptly negotiated an even more favourable deal on the trees allowing themselves the money to have them moved to the right place by someone who knew what he was doing!

Please do go up to the allotments/playing field and enjoy the Jubilee Commemorative Trees!

It's been a busy time for improvements on the playing field and allotments. At clean up day on Sunday 12th April, a group of willing volunteers installed wooden barriers to improve safety on the playing field by restricting vehicle access. You may have seen the improvements made a few months ago to the roadway to the left of the village hall. All vehicles should now use that access unless other permission is granted. There was also a record amount of rubbish picked up from around the village, showing the value of these days. Many thanks to those who were so diligent.

On Saturday 11th a (familiar) group of willing volunteers, had fun with a mini-digger to install two additional stand-pipes on the allotments. Allotment holders have been asking for this for many years but now the taps have the added advantage of making watering the new trees very much easier.

With David Webb about to step down after 8 busy years as Parish Council Chairman, it is great to see our precept being spent on these improvements before he leaves. I'm sure he will reflect on his other achievements at the Annual Parish Meeting in June and we will have a chance to thank him for his time then, but I'd like to put a THANK YOU DAVID in the newsletter, too.

If you would like to be involved in projects such as these please consider standing for the parish council - there are vacancies now - or look out for details of the next clean up day in the Autumn.
