Resignation of the Revd Michael Matthews

Unfortunately, the family issues for Michael and Stephanie have intensified over the past couple of weeks, so Michael has made the difficult decision to resign from early October.

In his statement on 30th July, Michael said that, "*I will be formally liaising with Bishop* Donald at the beginning of next week, and I am hopeful that he will give me 'Permission to Officiate', so that I can continue to offer regular service to Parishes across the Deanery, especially if they, and our Bishop, feel I can be of use. My last Sunday in Churches will be Sunday October 4th, that being the Yarwell Scarecrow Festival Day, with Afternoon Tea. It has been great fun, and a privilege to work with you all, on our first steps as a common Christian community. I will use the next few weeks to assist in putting together plans, rotas, and arrangements for the Vacancy period ahead."

I am sure we are all very disappointed in this news, and we will continue to provide support for Michael and Stephanie over the next couple of months. We need to say a big thank you to Michael for all he has achieved over the past two years.

During August Churchwardens have looked at the options for replacing Michael, however, we may have to accept that there are very few candidates available at the moment and a large number of local similar vacancies, so we may be in a vacancy period for some time.

Toilet Project

Fundraising continues for this project in the form of a COFFEE MORNING on Saturday, 12th September, from 10am until 1pm. Besides coffee and cake, there will be books and plants on sale, together with a display of old photographs of Woodnewton from the village History Group. Also. later on in early evening, we were delighted that Eric played for our Choral Evensong, whilst John Miley conducted the choir which was made up of local people from the surrounding area.

Woodnewton Neighbourhood Watch

Notifications of phone and email scams.

Fine Art Scam - People nationwide are receiving cold calls and are being persuaded to invest in 'Fine Art'. Concerns around this include:

• How the commodity is being offered, such as how the cold callers persuade victims to part with their money.

• Hidden costs charged to the victims to view the product, shipping costs or additional fees to store the item.

How to protect yourself:

- If the investment sounds too good to be true it probably is.
- Hang-up on investment cold calls. Legitimate companies will not ring-up and offer you an investment out of the blue.
- Do not give out personal financial information to cold callers

• Check whether the art dealer is a member of a trade association, such as The Society of London Art Dealers (SLAD), The Association of Art and Antique Dealers (LAPADA), The British Art Dealers Association (BADA) or Confederation of International Dealers in Art Work (CINOA).

• Request copies of old receipts, invoices and question the history of the previous owner of the art investment, to check if the product is genuine before investing.

Fake Bailiffs

There has been an increase in the number of small to medium sized businesses being contacted by fake bailiffs requesting payments for a phantom debt. The scam involves the business being cold called from someone purporting they are bailiffs working on behalf of a court, attempting to recover funds for a non-existent debt. The caller will then request payment by means of bank transfer and if this is refused, will threaten to visit the premises to recover the debt that is owed.

A range of different businesses are being targeted; including Nurseries, Manufacturers, Hotels and Taxi Services.

Protect yourself by :-

• Confirm what the debt is regarding; bailiffs are only used to recover certain debts such as council tax, child support and compensation orders. Bailiffs are not used to recover debts relating to private advertisement; these would be collected by debt collectors. Debt collectors do not have the same legal powers as bailiffs and will not have special court authorisation to act. For more details regarding this, please look at the Citizens Advice website.

• Double check with the Court or originating company to confirm whether the suspects are legitimate; if you use a landline make sure you hear the dialling tone prior to dialling as the suspects could still be on the line.

- Request details of the debt in writing to access its legitimacy.
- Do not feel rushed or intimidated to make a decision based on a phone call.

Lottery email scam Finally - A WNW contact has recently received the following email ... UK MILLIONS LOTTERY RE: WINNING RESULT NOTIFICATION

Dear Sir/Madam, This is to notify you that your email address has won £1,000,000.00 (One Million Great British Pounds Only) in the UK Millions Lottery. It is a random computerized selection With Raffle no: 56475600545 188 Serial No: 5388/02 Winning Number: 05-11-13-17-44-48-(25) Draw (#1055). ... etc ...

Apparently this is a well known email scam. The WNW contact in this instance was suspicious as he doesn't take part in the UK lottery! Please ignore this type of email. If you, or anyone you know, have been affected by these frauds or any other scam, report it to Action Fraud by calling 0300 123 2040 or visiting www.actionfraud.police. uk





On the Plot

I have gardened for most of my life and, on my allotment plot, I have tried to follow what has seemed to be 'good allotment practice'.

One practice that I latched onto very early and which has stayed with me ever since is that of the inventive use of materials to make whatever equipment I might need. Allotment gardeners, it seems to me, rapidly become experts at bodging bits together to make the things that they need. Many of us here are of an age that allowed us to watch Geoff Hamilton each week on Gardeners World - and boy was he an expert at this very thing!

I still get very great pleasure from making various bits and I suspect that I always will. However, during this year I decided that I had been taking things too far. Areas of my allotment were full of things that 'might come in handy'. So for once I decided to be ruthless. I have thrown a certain amount out - not all, by any means, but quite a lot! Having done this I then decided that I should buy a couple of bits of kit instead of doing making do, as I have done for years.

This was not a cheap option by any means and maybe that is partly why I have never ventured too far in this direction before. I spent a considerable time searching for what seemed 'the best' and of course that choice added to the price tag. However, what I now find is that life is considerably easier and that there is very great pleasure in having things that are well thought out and that work easily and well. I am so glad that I spent a little extra, rather than making do with cheaper equivalents.

And the purpose of this ramble? Well, to suggest that you might consider doing likewise on occasions. It seems to me that quality products will do the job intended well and for very many years, so the expense is probably justified. Also it is hard to put a price on the pleasure gained from using well designed and well made equipment.

As I mentioned above, I shall not stop bodging, but I'll just do rather less of it! Yes, I know there are those who consider my allotment one great bodge, but I am trying to improve - and now with a little more expense than before!On

As for jobs I need to get on with, there are very many. I would suggest that as ground becomes vacant you try and sow some green manure. It is an exceptionally good soil conditioner (been listening to 'The Archers'?) and it does a very good job of keeping weeds at bay until you dig it in. Field beans, ryegrass and phacelia can stay in the ground over winter and be dug in next spring. Nutrients in the soil are held rather than leached out as they often are over winter when soil is fallow.

What a lot of good ideas. No doubt feedback will be quick to come my way.....!


