The Parish Council met on 2nd November.

Public Time

District Cllr Valerie Raven-Hill came to introduce herself and spoke about the committees she now stands on: Scrutiny, Standards and Complaints, and Rural Affairs. Please see the minutes for more details.

Planning

Council discussed 4 planning applications with the following returns: Cherry Holt Farm - Objection; The Old Milking Parlour - No Objection; 28 Main Street Eucalyptus felling – No Objection; 26 Main Street.- No Objection

St Mary's Hill ownership plan

There is one 60m² section for which the Parish Council may contribute to the cost of resurfacing. This remains under discussion. When residents purchase houses on unadopted roads they should be made aware by their solicitor of the costs involved in maintenance of the road.

Allotments

All rents payable have been collected: a total of £408. There is one vacancy.

Review the budget and set the precept for 2016-2017

Budget proposed was unanimously agreed. The council can afford to meet its commitments and £2,000 worth of projects without raising the precept or any additional external funding. Other projects could be paid for from the reserve or with a grant. Precept to be set in the 7th December PC meeting.

Online shopping for Christmas? (from www.getsafeonline.org)

Please follow these tips:-

- Ensure you have effective and updated antivirus/antispyware software and firewall.
- Don't pay for goods when using an unsecured wi-fi connection.
- Don't reply to unsolicited emails from companies you don't recognise.
- Remember that paying by credit card offers greater protection than with other methods in terms of fraud, guarantees and non-delivery.
- Some websites will redirect you to a third-party payment service (such as WorldPay). Ensure that these sites are secure before you make your payment.
- Double check all details of your purchase before confirming payment.
- Keep receipts.
- Check credit card and bank statements carefully after shopping to ensure that the correct amount has been debited, and also that no fraud has taken place as a result of the transaction.

Before entering payment card details on a website, here are 3 ways to check that the link is secure:-

- There should be a padlock symbol in the browser window frame, which appears when you attempt to log in or register. Be sure that the padlock is not on the page itself this will probably indicate a fraudulent site.
- The web address should begin with 'https://'. The 's' stands for 'secure'.
- If using the latest version of your browser, the address bar or the name of the site owner will turn green.

If you think you've been a victim of fraud, report it to Action Fraud, the UK's national fraud reporting centre, by calling 0300 123 20 40 or by visiting www.actionfraud.police. uk.

Are you ready for winter?

The Met Office is hosting a set of web pages with advice and links to a range of information to help you prepare for every aspect of the winter season.

Top tips this winter...

- Make sure your pipes are lagged and set your heating on a timer to avoid frozen pipes.
- As the nights draw in it's even more important to make use of light timers so that burglars can't tell if there's no one at home. An upstairs light is a particularly effective deterrent. Visit http://bit.ly/dnburglary to download more anti-burglary advice.
- Remember that everyday items in the garden as well as loose slates, tiles and branches - can become "missiles" when it's windy, so clear them away or make sure they're secured.
- Some heating appliances can leak carbon monoxide if fitted incorrectly. Make sure you've got a carbon monoxide alarm.







The Drinking Establishments of Woodnewton (Part 2)

2. **The Oak, or The Royal Oak** – The 1851 census records a William Firmeadow (Furmelow, Femelow and Firmilows) living at this address, which was along Fotheringhay Road (the entrance to Stone Pit). As his surname shows several different spellings. This suggests that he was unlettered. The records show that he was a beer seller, so the Oak was not licensed as a Public House. The Oak remained in the Firmedow family, passing to Thomas in 1885, upon the death of William's wife Mary. Thomas died in 1928 at the age of 86 years. There are also different spelling of Thomas' surname too; Firmilow and Firmilows.

The 1960 Electoral Roll lists an Akred family as living at the Oaks, but was this at one of the houses alongside, as all the properties had the same address? Can anyone help on the fact as to when the Oak stopped selling beer please?

3. Horse & Jockey - The house now called Oliver's Folly, a Grade II listed building. It



is known to have been built during the early to mid 18th century and extended in the 19th century. The first licensee was Thomas Hardy in 1847, continuing until the late 1860's when it was taken over by his son, John Thomas; information from Kelly's Trade Directories. Joseph Dolby from Apethorpe appears to have taken over in 1846 on the death of John Thomas Hardy, at a very young age of 41 years. A newspaper article from January 1886, states that Joseph Dolby, the publican, was assaulted by two men who were fined 20s. Joseph Dolby left the Horse and Jockey in 1894 and became the Landlord at the Hare and Hounds.

John Lindsey and his family moved from Folkingham, Lincolnshire, to become the next Licensee. John did not run this Public House for very long as he died in 1904 at the young age of 50 years. His wife, Mary Ann, continued as Publican until the early 1920's, as we know that Henry Hind appeared on the Electoral Roll in 1926. The Horse and Jockey continued to trade with different Licensees over the following decades, but the pub fell into disrepair and a change of use order placed on it in 1967, when it was purchased by the current owners.



4. The White Swan, or the Swan as it was recorded in 1914 - The first record of a victualler being recorded here was a Thomas Henson in 1790. However, he only held the licence for just under 10 years as probate records show that he died in 1799. Ann, his widow, followed in his footsteps until her death in 1807. We know from Church records that the Henson family had obviously lived in Woodnewton for well over a hundred years as a Baptism in 1670 provides us with that information.

Two further publicans have been found between 1810 and 1828, when the well known Woodnewton family of the Barfields appeared on the scene. Although the Barfield name is synonymous with Woodnewton over the last 180 years, the name actually dates back many centuries to the old county of Rutland.

Sarah, is the first Barfield name to appear as a victualler at the Swan, but who was she? Samuel, arrived from Kings Cliffe in 1826 with his young wife, Ann and their first child. Life must have been hectic for Samuel and his family, as he had the wheelwright's business to look after as well as the Inn. Although, Samuel Barfield is recorded as a victualler in the records at Northampton Record Office, he died in 1849 and, his wife, Ann, is shown in the 1854 Kelly's Directories as the next Licensee. Ann and Samuel junior, continue to run to run the Swan until 1861, when William Firmeadow took on the Licence. The Swan stayed in this family until the 1920's.

Could the ladies in the picture be Eliza Firmeadow (now Licence holder) and her daughter Louisa Jane?

After 1920, the pub changed hands many times and as we see from this picture, the house alongside the Swan where Miss Burgess lived, was taken down, (date unknown – shown on 1968 Electoral Roll), and in the 90's a porch and toilet extension was built.

So from this research the pub that was the first to open in Woodnewton is still up and running.

On The Plot



As I wander around in my shirt sleeves enjoying the balmy warmth of an early November morning, my thoughts naturally turn to the approaching festive season. (My proof reader reckons that I should erase the last four words in that sentence). Perhaps some time during that season this year I should resolve to try to be totally truthful! Christmas approaches and with it thoughts of ideal presents for keen (and not so keen) gardeners. Fear not. Dodge has done some of the thinking for you. All you have to do is be trusting and get out and spend! All the recommendations I make in the lists below

are of items that I use and would seriously not be without. I think that many are the best of their type.

My allotment 'bible' has for many years been "Grow Your Own Vegetables" by Joy Larcom. It contains a wealth of gardening information and is written by a real gardener. Other books that I use a lot are: "The RHS Allotment Handbook", "The Fruit Tree

Handbook" by Ben Pike and "Growing Fruit" by Harry Baker. A lovely month by month narrative is written by Terry Walton, and is entitled "The Allotment Almanac". My membership of the Royal Horticultural Society is something I treasure. It gives me free access to many wonderful gardens, not least those belonging to the Society. Above all I get so much advice and information from other members, the monthly publication "The Garden" and from the website. Gift membership would be a great present for any gardener. Of course, I know I get lots of advice from other plot holders, but as you will deduce, I am talking here about genuine quality.......

If seeds (or seed gift vouchers) are an option, then I recommend Marshalls, Dobies (and here I mean the seed company in Devon, not Dobbies, the garden supermarket) and Edwin Tucker. All can be readily found on a Google search. Mrs Dodge uses Sarah Raven seeds and plants and seems very pleased with her choice.

As for garden tools I really do rate those produced by Wolf - you tend to buy suitable handles into which fit a number of different tool heads. They are excellent. Harrison and Dunn in Stamford also have a great selection of stainless steel spades and forks at very good prices.

In general I do recommend that you buy stainless steel where possible. It cleans and works the soil so much more easily than ordinary steel types do.

As for small hand tools such as trowels and hand forks, those by Burgon and Ball, sold by the RHS and others are just superb. They are ergonomic and just lovely to use. They beat others by miles! In that category also are Felco secateurs.

A final suggestion is that you look at Access Garden Products based in Crick - not cheap, but excellent and Greenhouse Sensation, mentioned last month. All details can be found on respective websites.

Whatever you choose to give, Mrs Dodge and I wish you a very happy Christmas and a great New Year.
