Christmas Celebrations

Our celebrations started on the Tuesday of Christmas week with our Annual Carol service. Bathed in candlelight, a full church of adults and children from Woodnewton and nearby sang many of the popular Christmas Carols, some of which were accompanied by a group of young musicians from London. We were very grateful to the representaives from different organisations who told the story of the Birth of Jesus through the reading of the seven lessons. Afterwards refreshments of mulled wine and mince pies were enjoyed by all who stayed behind to have a chat with friends.

On Christmas Eve, eighteen children and their parents gathered in church for the Crib Service. The children sang, read prayers, built up the Nativity Display with the Christmas Figures and then had to search for Jesus, the most important part of the Nativity. Maureen Woodd, who took the service, shared gold with the children, in the form of chocolate coins. The collection of £70 from the Christingle and this Service was sent to the Children's Society.

The Holy Communion Christmas Day service was celebrated by Revd Peter Konig.

Woodnewton Neighbourhood Watch

Police safety advice for the motorist ...

•Plan your journey carefully. Know what route you are taking and let other people know where you are going and when you hope to arrive. Keep a map in the car so that you don't have to stop and ask for directions.

•Never leave your keys in the ignition whilst you are out of the car for any reason. Keep the doors locked when you are driving and keep bags and other valuables out of sight.

•If someone approaches the car when you are parked or stopped at lights, only roll down the window enough to hear what they want but not enough for someone to get their arm through.

•Make sure your car is serviced regularly. In winter it is especially important to keep your lights clean and your battery fully charged.

•Check you have up-to-date breakdown cover and that you know the number to call if you break down or have an accident. If possible, carry a mobile phone with you at all times. If you break down, pull as far off the road as you can and put your hazard warning lights on. Call your breakdown organisation, letting them know if you are travelling alone and if you have children with you. If you break down on a motorway, it is usually safer to wait for assistance outside your vehicle, standing on the verge or behind the crash barrier. Take your keys with you and lock all doors except the one nearest to you, which you can leave wide open, so that you can get in quickly if you need to.

•If you witness an accident or someone tries to flag you down, think carefully before stopping. It may be safer to drive on and phone the police from a safe location.

•If you think someone is following you, keep driving till you come to a busy location such as a garage or motorway services. If you are really worried, drive straight to the

nearest police station. If you feel threatened make a note of the type of car and its registration number.

•If your car is hit from behind, think twice before you get out of the car. If you feel threatened, lock your doors and sound your horn to attract attention and use a mobile phone to contact the police.

•Avoid using poorly-lit car parks. Whenever possible, choose a manned car park and park as close as you can to the attendant. Reverse into the space and hide all valuables Shut all windows. Lock all doors. Note where you have parked your car. When returning to your car, have your keys ready so that you can get in quickly. Before entering scan the back seat to check no-one has climbed in. Once you are in the car, lock the doors immediately.

And for the cyclist ...

•Make sure you have home insurance that includes your bike.

•Record your bike (take a photo, log the frame number etc) and register it. If the bike's stolen, report it. Mark your bike with SmartWater.

•If you're buying a secondhand bike, be vigilant and cover your back. If you buy a stolen bike, even unknowingly, you can forget about statutory rights – it'll be recovered and you're unlikely to see a penny. Don't be naïve: If you're buying a new racing bike for £200 and paying cash, something's not right.

•If you're buying a secondhand bike, use PayPal. The company's buyer protection scheme means that, should your bike later be found to be stolen, you'll be able to recover the money as long as less than 45 days have elapsed.

•When leaving your bike in a public place use two different locks (eg a cable and a D-Lock) – a thief will have to carry two tools to steal your bike.

Ingredients

250g granulated sugar

300g self-raising flour

4 eggs

200g butter, softened

5 drops vanilla essence

2 large apples, peeled

1/2 small beetroot

Serves 12

(depending on the size of the slices!)

Method:

1) Beat together the butter, sugar and egg yolks until smooth.

2) Chop the apples into small slices and add to mixture.

3) Finely grate the beetroot and stir in well. Add vanilla essence.

4) Whisk the egg white until stiff, fold into mixture.


5) Sift in the flour and stir well.

6) Grease and lightly flour a loaf tin, add the mixture and spread evenly.

7) Bake in a pre-heated oven at 180°C for around one hour. Poke a knife into the cake to see if it is baked; if there is cake dough on the knife, bake longer.
