

Woodnewton Neighbourhood Watch

Are you thinking of installing an alarm system for your property? If so here's some advice from the police:-

Do I need an alarm system?

Intruder alarms are an effective deterrent against burglars. They provide a useful warning and limit the risk of theft and damage to property. Criminals do not like attracting attention to their activities. They do not know what response the alarm has triggered.

Are there different types of alarm systems?

Essentially there are two types of alarm systems.

- •An audible only system, which will sound a bell or siren to attract attention and help deter any potential burglary. This system should comply with the current recognised standards.
- •Monitored systems will, in addition, send a signal to a central monitoring station that can alert the Police. This type of alarm system should be installed by a Police compliant company to the current standards. Some systems can be programmed to dial direct to a key holder for those purposes. They must not be programmed to dial any Police telephone numbers.

How do I choose a company to install an alarm?

We recommend that you obtain quotes from at least three security companies who are subject to independent inspection by a recognised body such as:

- •NSI (National Security Inspectorate) www.nsi.org.uk Tel: 01628 637512
- •SSAIB (Security Systems and Alarms Inspection Board) www.ssaib.org Tel: 0191 296 3242

Details of security companies in your area can be obtained from the two organisations above. Or you may wish to take advice from your insurance company to ascertain which installation companies they may accept. This could lead to a reduced premium.

Will the police attend alarm activations?

The Police will attend when they receive notifications from a central monitoring station that a monitored system has been activated. The Police will also attend the activation of an audible only alarm system, if there is additional information that an offence is in progress.

Before deciding on a particular system, are there any questions I should ask the security company?

- •Ensure that before you disclose any personal details that you have checked the identify of the representative and the company's credentials.
- •You should only discuss your requirements with a company you have contacted. Do not have any dealings with companies that could call you by the telephone or knock on your door.
- •If you have any doubts, contact your local Trading Standards office for advice.
- •Ask which independent inspectorate the company is subject to e.g. NSI, SSAIB, etc.
- •Does the alarm system comply fully with the current recognised standards?
- Are there any maintenance and/ or monitoring contracts, or additional hidden extras such as call-out charges etc?
- •Do you own or rent the system?
- •What period of time does the guarantee last for and what happens if there is a problem after that?
- •Ask if there is a 24 hours call-out service and emergency attendance within 24hours.
- Ask the installer if they provide adequate training for you on how to operate the system.

Do not accept verbal contracts. Ensure that any agreement between you and the company are written and that you or your representative read the contents carefully before signing.

There will be a book and plant stall at the Open Gardens and Flower Festival, so if anybody would like to donate any items we would be very grateful. For collection please telephone 470758

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
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After 2 years absence the first two dates that Thomas will be steaming at his home the Nene Valley Railway have been announced.

Anouk's recipe for May



Woodnewton Nettle and Feta Quiche



Ingredients

Pastry:

250g plain flour A few sprigs of thyme A handful of sage 125g Trex vegetable fat/butter

Vegetable mixture:

1tbs olive oil
1 onion
1 red pepper
½ cauliflower
100g stinging nettles
(use tender tops)*

150g feta cheese

Egg mixture:

4 large eggs 200ml milk Mint Parsley Thyme

Method:

- 1) Make the pastry; measure the flour into a mixing bowl with the herbs and combine. Add the Trex/butter and rub together until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs.
- 2) Add small amounts of water to the mixture until you form a pliable dough.
- 3) Put in the fridge for around half an hour to make it easier to roll out later.
- 4) Make the vegetable mixture; pour the olive oil into a large saucepan. Chop the onion and add to the pan. Fry for a few minutes until translucent.
- 5) Meanwhile, chop the red pepper, break half a cauliflower into small florets and add to the saucepan, then add the nettles. Add some water and sweat with a lid on a low heat, stirring occasionally, until the vegetables are just tender.
- 6) Make the egg mixture; crack four eggs into a mixing bowl along with the chopped herbs and milk. Whisk until well combined.
- 7) Take the pastry out of the fridge and roll out to fit a large flan tin. Blind bake for ten minutes.
- 8) Pour in the vegetable mixture.
- 9) Grate the feta cheese and sprinkle evenly over the quiche.
- 10) Pour the egg mixture on top and put in the oven at 200°C for half an hour.

^{*}Harvest the top two leaves of young stinging nettles. Be sure to avoid nettles growing near sprayed crops. Did you know that nettles are a great source of iron and fibre and are said to have a host of other health benefits?

On The Plot

May is a glorious month when, with luck, the weather really improves and plant growth of all sorts is very evident. I love it, but I am also aware that amongst all the good, the bad lurks not far away. Yes, I'm sure that one or two regular readers will wonder if I am referring to them, but no, I refer to insect pests and to the possibility of frost. As we all know, it is easy to be carried away by the promise of a few sunny and warm days. However, rather cold nights are far from uncommon in May in this area and so it is very wise to have protection at hand.

'Solid' forms of protection such as cloches and cold frames are great, but do remember that ventilation during the day is vital as very high temperatures can build easily if that is not provided.

More versatile in many ways are the various forms of fleece and veggiemesh. I say this because to a degree they are self regulating. Once covered, crops will be protected and, because the material is essentially porous, excessive temperatures will build less easily. However, where possible you should try to raise the material so that it does not touch the leaves of especially frost susceptible plants. Potatoes are a good example. I have covered these in the past without taking such precautions and wherever the fleece made contact with leaves, they were frosted.

Are you aware that there are different weights and qualities of fleece? I tend to purchase the heavier version (30g) because it lasts longer and provides better protection. 17g is OK, but to my mind is a bit flimsy. The latter is very common in many garden centres, so reference to specialist catalogues is recommended.

Thermacrop is a new type of protective material not unlike fleece, but it is stronger, easier to handle and longer lasting. It is more expensive, but I am going to try it because it could offer advantages and be economic over time. I notice that it appears in catalogues from Gardening Naturally and Harrod.

Veggiemesh (also called enviromesh and insect-mesh) is another material I would not be without. It comes in different mesh sizes - the smallest for protection against such pests as flea beetle and the larger size for protection against many other insects, especially carrot fly.

Essentially I do use this material to protect crops from insects, but it does have some thermally protective qualities and so can protect against frost quite well at this time of year. Without it my brassicas and carrots would be mercilessly attacked to the point where they are rendered useless, so I strongly recommend its use.

Do get the correct mesh size for your purpose though and, if in doubt, always buy the finest.

If a framework to support these materials is required, a cheap and effective method is to use hoops formed from blue alkathene water pipe.

Here's to a season free from pestilence of all types. I wonder ??...

Dodge the Flak

Bee - moaning the lack of honey bees!

This winter has been disastrous for my 4 hives of honeybees in Nassington. The mild winter ensured the bees were flying more than usual rather than going into torpor. Many could not make it back to the hive due to the lack of winter food and then with reduced numbers could not survive the cold snap in February, despite emergency feeding. The wonderful weekend at the beginning of April was warm enough to allow a quick inspection. This is normally an exciting time, when the queen has begun laying eggs and the hive is preparing for a season of work. Sadly all I found was 4 hives with bees dead on their frames. In the 8 years of beekeeping I have never lost 100% of the hives I have.

I now need to restock.

If anyone has a swarm of bees in their garden I would be very willing to rehouse them. Honey bee swarms may looking alarming, but are infact quite docile when they have settled. It looks like a rugby ball of bees, usually hanging down from a branch. Bees that have entered old tree holes or into cracks in masonry are unlikely to be honeybees but are probably another species of bee.

If there are any beekeepers in the village who would like to make up a nuc or perhaps do an artificial swarm then I would love to hear from you as well.
