Parish Council Report – September 2016

We are still short of people on the Parish Council which is why, if only one or two are away we don't have enough people to convene a meeting. The Parish Council exists to look after the interests of the village as a whole and it is important that we have a full quota of Councillors. The lack of a Council report this month allows me enough space to appeal again for anyone who wants to join us. The Council meets 11 times a year and spends approximately £12 000 of your money on areas like the playing field, cemetery and street lights for example. Parish Clerk

Whilst we are on the subject of council positions, we will soon have a vacancy for a Parish Clerk. The Clerk's role is secretary/financial officer to the Parish council and is a paid position. Hours are approx. 150 p.a. and include monthly evening meetings but can otherwise be worked to suit yourself at home. Full training is provided. Woodnewton Neighbourhood Watch

Rogue Traders are fraudsters pretending to be salesmen, builders, gardeners or other tradespeople trying to convince you that you require urgent maintenance to your house or garden. They will cold call and try to pressurise you into a quick decision to allow work to be carried out for a 'special cash price'.

They will be charming and very believable having answers to all your questions, preying on older vulnerable people and deliberately overcharging for unsatisfactory goods and services. It is common for a price of £50 to be mentioned to complete new tarmac on your driveway, only for this price to escalate to £50 per square yard! Ten square yards "£500 cash please, NOW". Unfortunately it will not end there. Once a payment has been made in cash the fraudsters will be back with other ruses or they will trade the persons details on to the next team.

In one such incident in Lincolnshire it was known that five different teams had their claws into an elderly victim, with monies being paid over on a regular basis for alleged roof work and garden maintenance. It culminating in a violent attack with five balaclava wearing offenders demanding to know where he kept his money before leaving with numerous antique items. Rarely will a person who has paid cash to fraudsters be targeted only once. Whilst sometimes referred to as 'cowboy' builders' these criminals will offer no cancellation paperwork or try to get you to commit to having the work completed there and then and waive your legal rights.

REMEMBER:

- Do Not deal with Cold Callers.
- Do Not allow Cold Callers into your home.
- Do Not pay CASH on the doorstep.
- Do Not employ passing workmen.
- Never go with a cold caller/passing workman to withdraw money from bank or cash machine.
- Call police if uninvited callers will not leave.

If you suspect such an incident has occurred to you, a relative, neighbour, friend or someone you look after please report it to the police immediately via 101.

Woodnewton autumnal aubergine and feta couscous



Ingredients

2 medium aubergines
250g wholemeal
couscous
1 red pepper
250g carrots,
chopped
1 can chickpeas
½ head celery
4 cloves of garlic
2 onions
100g roasted
unsalted peanuts
handful raspberries
250g feta cheese
olive oil
fresh coriander

Serves 5

Method:

1. Preheat oven to 180°C
2. Wash and dry the aubergines and place them whole on a baking tray in the middle of the oven, bake for one hour.
3. In a thick-bottomed pan, pour in some olive oil. When hot, add the chopped onions and garlic and fry until translucent.
4. Add the chopped carrots, pepper and celery. Put on the lid and sweat for 10 minutes (add some water if necessary).
5. Boil a kettle of water. Place the couscous in a pan and add 1½-times the boiling water to volume of couscous and some olive oil. Put on the lid and stand aside for 10 minutes. Use a fork to stir the couscous to make it fluffy and separated.
6. Add the can of chickpeas and the peanuts to the vegetable mixture. Season with salt and pepper.
7. Pour the couscous into the vegetable mixture and stir until well combined.
8. Arrange the couscous mixture in a large serving bowl.
9. Take the aubergine out of the oven and cut in half. Scrape out the inside with a spoon. Mash in some olive oil and salt and pepper.
10. Place the aubergine on top of the couscous mixture.
11. Sprinkle the handful of raspberries on top and crumble over the feta cheese.
12. Finally, add the chopped fresh coriander to finish.

On the Plot

I imagine that many will have noticed that there has been a table near the allotment gate for some weeks now offering surplus vegetables and fruit to anyone who would like them and asking for a small donation in return. As I mentioned a few weeks ago it has all been organised by David Townsend.

As I write around £50 has been donated to the Air Ambulance and a tidy sum has been collected and will be sent to Cancer Research.

David has asked me to thank all those who have supported this venture - either by taking items on offer and donating money or by supplying the necessary fruit and vegetables. There is little doubt that those involved have been really pleased to be able to give and to donate to such worthy causes.

On the subject of successful ventures, it is with a degree of hesitation that I have to report that one of our number up on the allotments has been adding to his trophy cabinet with abandon in the last few days. Following his visit to Nassington & Yarwell Flower Show over the last bank holiday the prize tally reads as follows:

Brassicas (Cauliflower) 1st; Potatoes 1st; Carrots (long) 1st;

Tomatoes (not cherry) 1st; Mixed basket (borrowed) of vegetables 2nd.

Yes, we are all wondering how he did it - and we have yet to be shown any form of proof. I understand that the certificates do exist and are at present away being framed ready to be placed on the walls of his shed, the door of which is being widened so that he can get in and out without injury! Look out for a series of articles entitled 'Growing Prize Veg' planned for the quiet winter months. That's if I can get the copyright before the BBC do. He reckons he doesn't come cheap, but Brian, we all know better!

Once the celebratory party is over (do let me know if you know where and when it is - also the entry fee), I'll get down to tidying up ready for the winter. It is a good time to plant garlic right now and also to make sure that you have sown some winter salads either in pots or trays in the greenhouse, or protected out on the plot. There are lots of varieties available for late sowing and many are really good.

If you grow brassicas over winter, I strongly recommend that you stake them. Stout bamboo canes will suffice for this job if you have nothing else. This is really beneficial because brassica plants do not enjoy being free to wobble around in the wind. Sprouts for example, will 'blow' if they are not kept secure in good, firm soil. It's a tedious job, but well worthwhile. If you do use bamboo canes, do try to cap each one with those plastic things specially made for the job. Unprotected canes really are quite dangerous as one bends over to pick from plants.

Talking of protection, I'd better prepare. The prizewinning plot is not far from mine!
