## **News and Reports**

The Parish Council met on 3rd April

**Public Time** 1 resident attended to seek more information on the siting of the new playground equipment, and to make the Council aware of the potential noise nuisance if the equipment is poorly sited. Council noted the comments. No final decision has yet been made. 2 residents attended to thank the Council for the work to co-ordinate all stakeholders in the re-surfacing of St Mary's Hill and to seek more information on timing and impact of the work.

**Planning** There were two applications to be considered. Both were returned without objections.

**Playground Project** The Council has met with the Village Hall Committee for a site visit to look at the siting of the new equipment. The next step is to meet with the suppliers and installers and agree the final plan to complete the work.

**Allotments** The Council refused a request by a resident to keep ducks on the allotment.

**St Mary's Hill** Council held a discussion regarding the re-surfacing. It was unanimously agreed that as the residents were keen to get involved Council thought it was a worthwhile project to support, it was further agreed that the re-surfacing of the three sections will take place at the same time in order for less disruption to take place. As part of the road is un-adopted Council take no further responsibility for the maintenance of this section of road.

Churchyard Dog Fouling The Clerk had submitted a PSPO application to ban dogs from the Churchyard due to amount of dogs that are currently fouling the paths and graves. Even if the application is successful, the ban does not have to be implemented and can be kept in reserve if other measures such as signs do not have the desired effect. The Council will continue to monitor the situation and take action if appropriate.

**Village Communication** The Council plans to investigate ways for improved communication of village events. The new website will help but there are other potential solutions provided with modern technology. The first part of the consultation will be at the Annual Parish Meeting on 23<sup>rd</sup> May.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Monday 8th May at 8.00pm

### St Mary's Church

#### From the Vicar

May brings Rogationtide, coming as it does, between the 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Easter and Ascension Day. Traditionally this was the time to ask for God's blessing and protection upon the fields and crops at a time when any blight or poor harvest would result in the community going hungry later in the year. Now, of course, with our supermarkets and efficient farming we are somewhat removed from that fear, but nevertheless, surrounded as we are by the agricultural life in this lovely area, it is still timely that we set aside a time to pray for our farmers and those who work on the land.

Rogationtide was also the time for "beating the bounds" when, in the days before freely available maps, Google Earth and the like, it was important for a village to know the bounds of their own land, so everyone would walk the boundary of their village. Boys were "bumped" on prominent marks and boundary stones, or even rolled in briars and ditches to ensure they never forgot the boundaries. Although we don't need to make sure our young folk remember their own fields anymore, this is a good time to give thanks for the place where live and to celebrate a sense of belonging; so important to our mental well-being. Perhaps we should also ask God's blessing upon those who feel, for whatever reason, that they don't belong, and do all that we can to build up the sense of community where we live.

The 17<sup>th</sup> century poet-priest, George Herbert, said that Rogationtide should be about asking God's blessing upon the fields, a sense of justice in keeping the boundaries of the fields, caring for each other in walking together as the village beat the bounds, offering a time for reconciliation and friendship, and a care for the poor by the distribution of charity. All of these can still be so relevant today, and perhaps this month we can think about how we can put his ideas into practice in our own ways.

Towards the end of May we will be having a particular focus in our churches on prayer – you are most warmly invited to join us.

### **New Patient Transport Arrangements**

Following the cessation of our own voluntary transport scheme, we have been in negotiation with Oundle Volunteer Action – this is an organisation based in Oundle who provide services to the community in particular the elderly and vulnerable, including transportation for medical appointments (hospital, doctor, dentist, optician, etc).

Anyone contacting the Wansford surgery will now be redirected to the OVA's office where they can register and discuss their needs for transport. At least 48 hours' notice should be given for a required journey – this allows time to arrange a suitable driver. More urgent requests will always be considered but the transport cannot be guaranteed. The charges for this service are 40 pence per mile from the patient's house to the destination point and return (minimum charge £3). Under normal circumstances the driver will wait for the duration of the patient's appointment. However if a long period is likely to elapse before the return journey, this should be notified to the office when booking. (Certain patients may be eligible for free hospital transport – the reception staff at Wansford can advise on this when contacted)

### **Woodnewton History Group**

Derek Gunn in Woodnewton

Derek Gunn, who worked in the Old Garage and Petrol Station Main Street (now No. 52), qualified as a Cabinet Maker at Northampton Technical College. In 1958 after his discharge from the forces, where for most of the time he was making furniture for officers, he started work as a woodwork teacher at King's Cliffe School and stayed there until 1972. Prior to leaving he had been teaching metal work and engineering drawing, as well as woodwork, to O-level standard.

With the onset of the three tiered system of education, Derek then decided to become self-employed and that is when he rented The Old Garage and Petrol Station (at that time a large stone barn) in Main Street from Mr Tommy Bould of King's Cliffe, which he used as a workshop. He went to Halifax to buy his essential machinery and then made anything that was needed.

Vic Black of Warmington used to help Derek and he introduced him to Mr Arthur Malster, who at the time was the owner of Crowsons Funeral Directors at Barnwell. Derek then started making coffins and other items of joinery and furniture for Crowsons. Unfortunately, Mr Malster developed health problems and subsequently asked Derek whether he would be interested in buying the business of Crowsons. This was an area in which Derek had always shown a great interest and so in May 1976 Derek closed the Woodnewton workshop, shortly after moving home and business to the premises in Barnwell. Mr Malster stayed working at Crowsons for two years or so whilst Derek learned the business fully and qualified as a Funeral Director with the National Association of Funeral Directors. He finally retired in 2003

#### On The Plot

A 'friend' reckons it was all wind last time. Now it's essentially a drought, but around now you will probably be feeling upset because it is so wet! It all saves us from boredom I suppose, as does my subject this month.

Slugs and snails are high on the list of pet hates for every gardener. Indeed the RHS report that this group is the main subject of pest enquiries they deal with.

One crumb of comfort presently may be that they are rather less evident in periods of dry than in wet times.

Be assured however that evident or not, they are there lurking, waiting to come and get your crops as soon as they put on any growth and they have nice damp surfaces it move over. They love young tender shoots, so seedlings can be wiped out overnight. Anything managing to grow beyond that stage, especially if it is essentially soft-tissued is high on the menu for them. Your plot is their Hambleton Hall. The only difference is that they get the feed for free and there is no travel involved - well, not much.

Faced with this grim situation, most gardeners do not sit back and smile. They utter very naughty words and reach for the slug pellets. The problem here is that, although this solution undoubtedly works, most readily available and cheaper pellets have the active ingredient metaldehyde in them. Unfortunately most users overdose ground to a very high degree. Some areas can literally be turned blue by the concentration applied. There is now no doubt that this chemical is dangerous to wildlife and can contaminate water supplies. It is proved no more effective when applied in such concentrations than when applied properly, which is around 1-2g/square metre. This equates to about one pellet every 4-6inches. Even then pellets should not touch any edibles.

If you use this material do please consider this fact carefully when applying and try to protect treated areas from birds and other wildlife using netting, fleece or any other suitable form of cover.

Pellets based on Ferric Sulphate are also available and less toxic to wildlife. They are certified as organic and should be applied at around twice the density as the former type. Nematodes can be purchased and watered into the soil. Nemasys is a well known make, but like all such treatments is expensive.

Other weapons include copper tape barriers which seem to have doubtful success except on pot edges. They are also pretty impractical on a vegetable or flower bed. Mulches based on wool, grit, bark or moisture-absorbent material can be used but again research shows them to be fairly ineffective. Beer traps can be set and work by attracting and drowning but many reckon they are just a waste of good beer!

A wildlife rich area is probably the very best defence so that natural control takes place. Failing all this, go out under cover of darkness armed with a torch and pick them off. I know someone who can offer instruction....... I wonder, will mine
