

News and Reports

The Parish Council met on 8th May

Public Time

1 resident attended to seek an update on the re-surfacing of St Mary's Hill and to seek more information on timing and impact of the work.

Planning

One application was considered, which was returned without objection.

Playground Project

All final points of the project and the installation work is scheduled to begin towards the end of July.

Allotments

The Council considered a number of comments from allotment holder regarding the increasing amount of damage done by rabbits. Council agreed to look at some control measures which could include cutting back of overgrown areas which are close to the edge of plots.

Playground

The monthly safety inspection of the playground had been completed and had identified the swing seats as area that required remedial action. The Council agreed to investigate the possibility of replacing the seats as part of the larger playground upgrade project.

Annual Meeting:

At the May meeting the Council is required to annually appoint a Chair and Vice Chair, and to delegate responsibilities for the forthcoming year. Individual Councillor responsibilities are as follows:

NASSINGTON GARDENS ON SHOW

Hundreds of visitors are expected to descend on Nassington the weekend of 24th and 25th June to wander through this lovely Northamptonshire village and take a look into the 20 plus gardens open to visitors. The event is part of the National Open Gardens initiative and for weeks has had many of the village's 800 residents planting, pruning and planning for the big event. Visitors will be able to draw ideas from a wide spectrum of gardens - from courtyard to new build, from modern through to the Prebendal Manor. The Manor's garden is understood to be Europe's largest recreated medieval garden and has been featured on BBC2, Radio 4 and in top magazines including Country Life.

Tea, cakes and other refreshments at the village hall will

keep everyone going and the day will also feature a craft fair and promises something for all the family.

Entry is £5 for each day for all over 16 years of age and the proceeds will be for the support of St Mary's Church Nassington – itself expected to attract many visitors over the weekend. The gardens will be open from 1pm to 5pm each day and special car parking provision has been arranged.

Nassington will soon be laying out the chairs, putting up its parasols and throwing open its gardens.



On The Plot

It is around now that many people decide they would enjoy growing their own tomato plants. Given reasonable care and decent weather, home-grown tomatoes prove extremely good value and crops can be very large. Your own produce will almost always taste better than bought varieties and certainly have a very high nutritional value. Added to this there is the undoubted pleasure of producing your own!

I have written before about types and planting. If you grow plants outdoors it is important to buy types bred specifically for this environment, so do watch out when loading your shopping basket.

Having planted up your grow bag, pots or greenhouse border it is vital that you keep your plants evenly moist throughout the growing season. Try hard not to water then forget for a week or so! Plants grown in such a way are often rather unhealthy and produce fruits which split. Also do ensure that you feed regularly with a high potash feed. This helps to give a good flavour to your crop.

There are two main types of tomato plant. Bush varieties, also known as determinate types, need no special attention apart from watering and feeding. They are good for smaller containers and hanging baskets, but they can certainly be grown in open ground.

Most people seem to grow upright, cordon types, also known as indeterminate varieties. With these it is vital that you provide support for your plants by using canes or something similar and also that you remove all sideshoots. So often this latter job is not undertaken and the grower smiles as very large bushy plants develop. The smile soon turns to a frown as very little in the way of decent fruit is formed. So, although this may seem rather harsh, do pinch out every sideshoot on a regular basis.

As the main stem rises, leaves will develop alternately on either side of it. Where the leaf stem (or petiole) comes out from the main plant stem a small shoot will develop in the 'v' that is formed between the main stem and the leaf petiole. This is the sideshoot and needs pinching out. Use either finger and thumb or a pair of scissors. A tool with fine points helps as space can be rather restricted. It's usually very straightforward, but as the plant develops it is incredibly easy to overlook these growths. Later in the season they have a nasty habit of forming sideshoots again lower down the plant in areas that you felt you had dealt with weeks ago!

Carry out these tasks and you will generally produce fine plants with heavy crops. If it's a good year that will be all you need to worry about. If not, blight may strike and your plants and crop will suffer. That's a whole new story and pages on the RHS website will give help on how to guard against this problem. For now let's look on the bright side and trust that you grow your best tomatoes ever! I really hope that you do.
