News and Reports

The Parish Council met on 11th December

Parish Clerk

For the last 3 meetings, since our previous Clerk resigned, the Council has been operating with a temporary Clerk. This is not an ideal situation but without a Clerk the Council cannot function or fulfil its duties. To enable us to continue to meet, and to represent residents, Liz Holland has been acting Clerk. The December meeting was the last meeting where Liz took on that role and it is hoped with will have a new permanent Clerk in place for our next meeting. Liz has done a tremendous job in picking up the pieces and the Council expressed its thanks to Liz for all the work she has done.

Budget

As is usual at the December meeting the Council must agree the priorities for the forthcoming year, and set the budget to match. The budget influences the Parish Precept that residents pay towards services in the village. From national government, through county and district councils, all parishes are being asked to do more and pick up the costs for delivering services. In addition, the annual inflationary costs such as insurance, electricity, and wages continue to rise. While the Council does have reasonable reserves built up over the last few years, it also has significant liabilities for which it must be prepared. The Council also aims to cover the rise in basic running costs year on year as part of its commitment to be a financially sound and responsible. The Council has for the last 8 years spent the greater part of its income on grass cutting and keeping the village looking tidy. This has been the express wish of residents. The Village has a lot of grass to cut, and once again in 2018 this expenditure will be approximately 60% of Council income.

A long discussion was held on the rate of increase in the Precept for 2018. The Council is aware of the impact of rises in the Precept on residents, but felt it must balance income and expenditure at the very least. As a result, it was proposed that the Parish Precept for 2018 increase by 6%.

Churchyard Trees

Residents may have noticed that the one of the three large trees in the Churchyard has been felled. The tree was diseased and dying and was a danger in itself and spreading disease to the two neighbouring healthy trees. A condition of the felling permission was that the Council replace the tree. To do so in the Churchyard would be to compound the problem in the long term so permission was sought from, and granted by ENC to plant the replacement tree in the Cemetery and this has now been done.

Donation

The Council received a donation of £30 to put to a good cause, and it was agreed to spend this money on wild flower seeds to be planted in an area close to the allotments.

In due course the Council will be looking for volunteers to come one Saturday morning and help to prepare the ground so please watch this space. Many hands make light work.....

Fruit trees

The Council has been offered and accepted the donation of some fruit trees. There is a vacant allotment plot which is on very poor ground and it was decided this may make a suitable space for the trees

There are numerous activities, events and organisations that contribute to village life. These only continue with the support and active participation of village people. So, on that note, please consider that one of your resolutions for the year ahead could be to become more involved; you might never know the fun you could have! There is a current vacancy for a councillor. On behalf of the Council, may I wish everyone living and working in Woodnewton a very happy new year, and I look forward to seeing you at the various community events throughout the year.

An Open Letter to Villagers

St Mary's Hill Road Resurfacing Project
– Thank You

Dear Villagers,

St Mary's Hill has been resurfaced - thank goodness! Over the years the combination of invasive churchyard tree roots, excavations, sewer repairs, frosty winters and traffic has caused the breakup of the road surface. Whilst the upper part of the Hill is a private road, old maps show the lower part of the Hill was an unadopted bridleway of indeterminate ownership. However, today, the responsibility for the maintenance of this roadway rests, in the main, with property owners.

These road repairs could not have been completed without contributions from NCC, the Parish Council, Western Distribution and the Trustees of Woodnewton Schoolhouse and Land Charity. Suffice it to say, the property owners on the Hill have contributed substantial personal funds to complete the project. Thanks must also be paid to Mr Richard Pike and his magnificent cutting machine for helping with the groundworks.

A Tribute

Regarding the repair work to the road surface on St Mary's Hill, one other individual should be recognised. Seven years ago Grant Mcleod began work on getting the road repaired. He spent endless hours emailing, telephoning and talking to anyone remotely interested in assisting to carry out the work involved.

He approached every local government agency and generally made a complete nuisance of himself. However it paid off and eventually he persuaded these same agencies to contribute financially, and together with some funds from the residents of "The Hill" we now have our new posh road surface.

FRANEY HOUSE



Thirty Seven Main Street, known as Franey House was built in 1745 by John Franey, who was a stonemason. The datestone above the door confirms this date.

Originally, built as a two unit property, it was turned into one when it was under the ownership of John Victor Walker. A Dovecote, now an outbuilding, was built in 1769 and housed about 250 nesting boxes. Both the house and the Dovecote was registered as a Grade 2 Listed Building in October 1988.

So who lived in the houses? Upon John Franey's death they were left to the family and it was Hannah Franey (possibly the daughter in law of the John Franey who had built the houses) on her death devolved the properties to Esuebius, Louisa and Sally Herepath. The two sisters surrendered their right to the properties for a consideration. Esuebius then disposed of the houses to Ezekiel S Desbrow, a Surveyor, who had obtained a loan from Rev W H Fisher to purchase them. This must

have taken place after 1901 as Esuebius is shown on the 1901 census as still living at Franey House in the right of the two properties

Ezekiel defaulted on the loan and the Rev Fisher foreclosed and then sold to Thomas Barnes, a retired Brewer. Obviously, Barnes did not live in the properties as the 1911 census shows that the Walker family were resident in both of the properties. From research we know that Thomas Barnes sold the properties to Ebenezer Bradshaw of Perio Mill, who still rented out the properties to Frederick Walker and family.

The properties were subsequently purchased by Frederick Walker after the death of Ebenezer's widow Charlotte Bradshaw who died in 1944. The houses were later made into one property and the Walker family lived there until the death of Catherine Walker in 1978. John Victor Walker, son of Frederick, ran his greengrocery business from the property for many years.

We first started at Stibby Cafe in August 2004 and opened 7 nights a week until the end of October. We shut the weekend of Sat/Sun 30th/31st Oct 2004 when the final part of the Flyover went in crossing the A1 at Stibbington junction. Doesn't time fly!
