Woodnewton Parish Council

The Council met on Monday 3rd December

Public Time:

One member of the Public attended during Public Time to express their views on the reorganisation of local government in Northamptonshire and the potential impacts on rural services. The resident asked the Council to respond to the Consultation period.

Planning:

The Council considered two applications; both were returned without any objections

Street Lights:

The Council agreed to make an application to the Secretary of State for the facility to borrow money. This is just a procedural mechanism and it is a requirement that residents are consulted and agree before any actual funds can be obtained. The Council has undertaken this measure in order to have another funding option available should grant applications fail. We have already been unsuccessful in one such application.

Budget:

The Council spent much time looking at budgetary options for the 2019/20 year. The annual precept is set at the January meeting and the Clerk provided various scenarios based on potential expenditure and funding sources. Given the uncertainty around the responsibilities that Parish Council's will be asked to take on as a result of the reorganisation it is vital that the Council equips itself with the funds to meet unexpected expenditure. To give you an example, the sort of things that being discussed as potentially being passed to Parish Council's to manage include gritting, local road maintenance and libraries.

Village Life:

As we move into the new year, many people will be thinking of resolutions for 2019. Woodnewton is a special place to live, with a great mix of people and things going on. The various groups and events don't happen by themselves. So, whether it's the Woodnewton Players, the Village History Group, St Mary's Church, Table Tennis, Music Group, Village Hall Committee, Bonfire & Fireworks night or the Clean Up Day, please consider joining or helping out any of these as one of your resolutions. This is particularly so, with regard to your Parish Council. For a number of months now I have been writing this column and asking for volunteers as we are currently operating with two Councillors less than we should have. This is not a long-term proposition and I would ask that you consider if you are able give up one evening a month to support your village.

The next meeting will be on Monday 7th January at 8.00pm

Communicare News

The general patients' meeting which took place at the end of November dealt with a number of matters. Following the guest presentation at the June meeting, the number of people registered for the 'Walking for Health' weekly activities in Nassington has now reached 60 with a regular attendance in excess of 20.

Dr Nally reported that negotiations with NorthamptonshireCC regarding the proposed development at Kings Cliffe were on hold due to the council's financial situation but it was now believed that the chosen site would be inadequate in size for the potential layout; investigations are in hand to locate other suitable locations. Arrangements for the convalescing/step-down unit development at Wansford are ongoing with planning permission being sought as well as continuing discussions with Peterborough hospital.

The group's funds now stand at £3647 having increased by £241 over the past three months – thanks were expressed for the generous donation given in memory of the late T.Cunnington. It was noted that the total still includes agreed ring fencing of £2000 but the balance of the amount given in memory of the late T. Smith has been used in part payment for new ECG machine sited at the Kings Cliffe surgery.

The practice is now using the services of newly appointed health care assistants employed by the Greater Peterborough Network of surgeries – these personnel attend patients who are for many reasons housebound to carry out various tasks such as taking blood, blood pressure checks, urine screening, pulse rates, but are not qualified to issue prescriptions.

Although there are notices visible in the surgery's reception area, local knowledge regarding the availability of appointments at the 'Hub' in Peterborough appear to be sketchy. The 'Hub' is operated by the Greater Peterborough Network and sited at the Boroughbury practice in the Lincoln Road area of the city. Appointments can be booked through various routes – by calling '111', on a website, or through the patient's own practice – it is not a 'walk-in' centre and appointments can only be booked for the following 24 hours. The facility is open 7 days a week – weekdays 6.30am to 8.30pm, Saturday 9.0am to 5pm and Sunday 9.0am to 12.30pm – it is staffed by local GPs, nurses, and Citizens Advice volunteers. Any patient attending must agree to their online records being shared. Services at the 'Hub' are continuously being monitored and expanded.

It was queried whether the surgery and pharmacy were taking steps to 'stock pile' supplies and drugs to allay any shortfall in deliveries as a result of the Brexit negotiations or lack of a trade deal with EU countries. However the practice had looked into this matter but unfortunately were prevented from taking any action by the NHS who had issued strict guidelines which prohibited such precautions.

The social group's coffee mornings are now suspended until February but their post-Christmas lunch will take place on Friday 11th January at the Cross Keys Inn at Kings Cliffe. Places are limited and will be allocated on first-come-first-served basis – further details can be obtained from Clare on 01780 470437 email: superfoguk@aol.com.


Woodnewton Cinema

The 0-6-0T engine No. 1800 was built by Hudswell Clarke in 1947 at about the time when Rev.W Awdry wrote his second book in which Thomas appeared. The little blue engine spent its entire working life at the British Sugar Corporation Peterborough factory pushing wagons of sugar beet up an incline until a diesel engine replaced the steam power of Thomas. The Peterborough Railway Society purchased this delightful little engine on 9th September 1973 and he was moved to the Nene Valley Railway, where he has since delighted his friends and children of all ages.

Well done to the village hall committee for putting on such a wonderful night. We had a lovely enjoyable evening and I am sure the rest of the audience did as well.


