Parish Council Report - July 2021

The Parish Council met on Monday 12th July.

Public Time

Two members of the public attended to express their views on the planning application submitted for 31 Main Street.

One member of the public attended to give an update on the churchyard wildlife enhancement project.

Playing Field

The recent ROSPA play equipment safety inspection report was considered and any remediation work highlighted was noted. The Council discussed the condition of the safety surfaces and resolved to investigate replacement in the longer term and repair in the short term.

Planning

- a) NE/21/00994/FUL change of use, returned No Objection.
- NE/21/00970/FUL new dwelling house 31 Main Street. Returned with Objections.
 The Council agreed to lodge an Objection to the application on a number of grounds including,
 - The size and scale of the proposal in comparison to neighbouring properties
 - The appearance and building materials proposed to be used in a conservation area
 - · Traffic and access for vehicles
 - Potential development beyond the building line

The Council also noted their concern about several inaccuracies in the Design & Access Statement

Rural Co-ordination Group

The Chairman reported back on the last meeting of the Group (a group of local parishes and Oundle Town Council). The meeting was primarily concerned with the scale of development in Oundle, currently approximately 300 houses in the pipeline, and the knock-on effects on transport, parking, and access to services. It was agreed to meet with representatives of North Northamptonshire Council to express the concerns expressed by the group and to encourage the development of a 'Rural Charter' that could be adopted by the Council for future reference.

Residents Survey.

So far, the survey has had 96 responses which is fantastic. Many thanks to everyone who took the time to respond. The Council considered a summary of the results and discussed some of the issues raised and how they could be addressed in the short term. Wansford & Kings Cliffe Surgery - Communicare

A joint meeting of the officials and the Practice Manager, Mrs Kirstie Lawes, was held last month. A whole range of matters was discussed at length including the current low level of funds – it is hoped that as Covid restrictions are eased various ideas for fund raising can be instigated. Monies held by the Group that have been 'ring fenced' for certain projects are yet to be utilized – in particular the proposed creation of a community garden at the Kings Cliffe Active site – discussions are ongoing with all parties concerned but it is hoped that a positive outcome will be achieved in the not too distant future.

In addition to the new doctors who have recently joined the practice, Catherine Ofiaeli and Catherine Parnell, Mrs Lawes informed the meeting that a male doctor, Rob Houghton, would also now be working at the surgery one day a week.

The national Covid vaccination programme continues at local centres – anyone who has not yet taken up the offer of a jab is strongly encouraged to do so without delay, particularly with the current 'third wave' engulfing the country. Mrs Lawes confirmed that plans are now in hand for the role out of the annual flu injections commencing early autumn – however it is not yet known how and when the proposed Covid booster jab will become available – this information will of course be circulated as soon as possible.

A matter which is cause for concern is the proposed NHS Digital Data Sharing. It was agreed by the meeting that this subject has not been widely promoted in the media and the majority of the population are probably unaware of it and its possible implications. The original deadline for patients to 'opt-out' of the scheme has now been extended to 1st September but with this date fast approaching, it is important that individuals take the opportunity to read up on the proposals and make an informed decision about the sharing of their own personal medical details. A quick and easy channel is via Google – NHS Digital Data Sharing – which offers a whole range of options including a direct online method to opt out through the official NHS website – alternatively this can be done by letter to your GP.

It is hoped that a back-to-normal general patients meeting can be held in late September – this will be our AGM and although there will be a small amount of business matters, we plan to have guest speakers – full details will be published in the September issues of local magazines and on the surgery website.

For those of you who remember Woodnewton Clownfest events in the early 1990s, will remember a custard clown by the name of Mr Woo, alias Bernard Moore from Peterborough. Unfortunately, Bernard passed away in June at the age of 81 years.

Mr Woo had worked with Coco the Clown and knew from Helen Rowland (Coco's daughter late of 7 Orchard Crescent) that the village was trying to raise money to build a village hall. Mr Woo very kindly offered the assistance of the Clowns who belonged to

Clowns International to help with the fundraising. So together with the Clownfest committee and Mr Woo, Clownfest number one was held on 23rd September 1990, and the village turned into Clownsville for the day.

This event was such a huge success for the village that it was repeated again in 1992 and 1994.

Parnings Paths Intertainment

The wonderful countryside that surrounds us has been shaped over many centuries by farming. For most of its history many of the inhabitants of our village would have had a direct or indirect dependence on farming for their livelihoods. I remember doing some research on the village as part of the village plan project back in 2006 and discovered that there were a number of businesses in the village in the 19th century that were agriculture related. Today I know that a number of you that are reading this are still engaged in one way or another with agriculture but I would be surprised if more that 1 in 10 of the current villagers have such a connection. I have no connection with farming, other than occasionally visiting a farm shop but over the last 18 months or so I have learned more about modern farming than I ever expected to.





I have admitted in the past that I watch far too many YouTube videos, mostly about subjects related to cars, motorbikes and technology, but starting sometime in 2019 I started to follow a YouTube channel called Harry's Farm. To ageing petrolheads like me, Harry Metcalfe may be a familiar figure. He founded and ran the excellent EVO car magazine in the 1990s and built up an interesting and eelectic collection of cars and motorcycles. He sold his interest in the magazine some time ago but not before he and some of his journalists had started posting EVO diaries videos on YouTube. Subsequently Harry started his own Harry's Garage YouTube channel where he covers his own collection of cars and also does personalised road tests on new models and other people's classic cars. It has become a popular channel, but what has this to do with farming?

Harry has always been a farmer - even before staring EVO - and as a spin off from his Garage channel he started his Harry's Farm YouTube channel. Every couple of weeks he posts a 10-15 minute video explaining what's been going on down on his farm in the Cotswolds. He has explained why he plants which crops, the ins and outs of EU and government regulations and all manner of other interesting stuff. I have found out how amazingly accurate those enormous spraying machines with the 18 meter booms have to be, how they use GPS during planting and harvesting, learned about seed-dressing, cabbage stem flea beetles, agronomists and that there is a wheat variety called Skyfall. I mentioned the Harry's Farm video to a fellow member of my car club and I discovered he worked for a company that makes the complex machinery that dresses the seeds.

It's made my dog walks more interesting. I take notice of the crops, the tramlines in the fields and think about the impact the weather is having. It has also given me an appreciation of how peaky the work load is and why during harvest time you see the lights in the fields in the middle of the night as the combines do their work.

One of Mr Metcalfe's farming neighbours is someone else that made their name and fortune in motoring journalism. That will be a certain Mr Clarkson. I am not sure if Jeremy was prompted by Harry's YouTube success to jump on the farming as entertainment bandwagon, but with support from Jeff Bezos's billions he has started his own farming series on Amazon Prime. It's a much more polished production with full camera crews and high production values but it's worth a watch. Unlike Harry who comes across as a

thoughtful and pragmatic lifelong farmer, Clarkson has to be Clarkson and do stupid things. It's show business, after all. But there is a delight in watching the reality of farming dawn on him. He is helped by a cast of real Oxfordshire folks who work with him on the farm.





Cheerful Charlie, his land agent is the voice of reason and calm; Caleb, his tractor driver, could go on to become a global star; Gerald, his incomprehensible dry-stone waller, seems to have a constant expression of patronising bemusement at Clarkson's missteps and his Irish girlfriend Lisa's putdowns are hilarious.

I am sure the real farmers amongst you will probably watch Jeremy and call out the inaccuracies but if you want to find out a bit more about the sorts of things that are going on all around you, year in, year out I can recommend both. If you have time to only follow one, I would choose Harry.
