All are warmly invited to our services as we journey through Lent and Holy Week and rejoice in the good news of the Easter message of hope and new life.

As I write this in mid-March I am enjoying the many signs of spring around me. The snowdrops (one of my favourites!) are going over and the daffodils and crocuses are taking their place. The blackthorn is blossoming and forming frothy white displays in hedgerows that are just beginning to turn green. It is a wonderful time of hope and expectation as we move out of winter.

However, of course I am also writing surrounded by the daily news from Ukraine; news of bombed cities, terrified and hungry citizens and many, many refugees fleeing their war-torn homeland. I have no idea what the news will be of when you read this in the April magazine; my deep, deep prayer is that there will at least be a ceasefire and negotiations, but there is also the shadow of continued fighting and so much more suffering and even an escalation of the conflict.

In the first days of the conflict I joined an incredibly moving online service led by the Bishop of the Anglican Diocese in Europe. The service included a reflection from an Anglican chaplain in Moscow and even contributions from the church warden of the Anglican Church in Kyiv. It was so poignant to see her speaking from her apartment in the city knowing that later that night she may be sheltering in a basement or tube station. To hear her pray the Lord's Prayer in Ukrainian as we all prayed the same words in our language was so powerful, reminding me of what we have in common in faith and in our very humanity.

I think we all have particular images from our newspapers or TV screens that encapsulate something of this dreadful situation. For me, these have guided my prayers and the reflections I have shared in church and I am sure that for all of us these pictures have had an impact on us, leading to action and thought.

It seems even more telling that all this is taking place in the Christian season of Lent which looks to Jesus' death on the Cross to draw all people into God's love and the overcoming even of death in the glory of the Resurrection. Easter is about hope from despair, about confidence in the providence of God from the depths of lament. For those of us of faith, prayers for peace, for an awareness of truth, for the overcoming of evil and the defeat of the corruption of truth are deep in our hearts. For so many of any faith or none is the desire to do something to help those in need and it has been a real sign of hope in the outpouring of love and care for those who have experienced such suffering in this conflict.

Easter is about hope, about the belief in God's providence. It is sometimes difficult to understand when we cry out, "O God, how can this happen – do something!" One of my Lent books, rather wonderfully, has been about hope and I have found some of the words particularly helpful. The author writes: "Trust in God's providence is beautifully expressed in the words of Jesus: Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your Father. (Matthew 10. 29)" She then goes on to quote another Christian writer commenting on this verse: "not everything that happens to us is the will of God, yet in the last resort nothing happens without his will, i.e. through every event, however untoward, there is always a way through to God." These words are even more shot through with an incredible trust in the providence of God in the midst of great struggle when we realise that the writer was the German pastor Dietrich Bonhoeffer who was writing from prison after being imprisoned and eventually executed because of his open opposition to Nazism. "Providence" the author concludes, " is God's faithful love watching over all that happens to us and to our world." (Hope and the Nearness of God. Teresa White. 2022)

May we, in whatever challenges we face as individuals and in our world be encouraged by words of hope and signs of hope, wherever we encounter them, and may we be part of bringing hope to others.

In 1982 Nassington & Apethorpe Cricket Club started playing at Apethorpe Hall on the front lawn. The hall was sold, and so the team moved to the field in Nassington - then just a meadow with no pavilion or facilities.

A disused wooden scout hut was obtained and erected on site. Over the years improvements were made starting with replacing wooden walls with breeze blocks, followed by small side extensions and a separate score box.

Local involvement

A team of dedicated volunteers work at the club maintaining the ground, clubhouse and managing the bar. The goodwill and community spirit have ensured the club has continued to grow and offer a friendly and fun atmosphere.

For our younger theatregoers, The Mother Goose Fable dates back to the early 18th century, when Charles Perrault's fairy tale collection," Contes de ma Mère l'Oy", was first translated into English as, - Tales of My Mother Goose.

Return Inn in Coronation Street. The costume design was spectacular.


